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writings by thinkers ranging from rokeya sakhawat hossain to bruno latour that focus on the interconnections of technology society and values technological change does not happen in a vacuum decisions about which technologies to develop fund market and use engage ideas about values as well as calculations of costs and benefits in order to influence the development of technology for the better we must first understand how technology and society are inextricably bound together these writings by thinkers ranging from bruno latour to francis fukuyama help us do just that examining how people shape technology and how technology shapes people this second edition updates the original significantly offering twenty one new essays along with fifteen from the first edition the book first presents visions of the future that

range from technological utopias to cautionary tales and then introduces several major theories it examines human and social values and how they are embedded in technological choices and explores the interesting and subtle complexities of the technology society relationship remedying a gap in earlier theorizing in the field many of the texts illustrate how race and gender are intertwined with technology finally the book offers a set of readings that focus on the sociotechnical challenges we face today treating topics that include cybersecurity geoengineering and the myth of neutral technology

anthology of thinkers ranging from freeman dyson to bruno latour focused on the interconnections of technology society and values and how these may affect the future

building a math community with chapter vignettes and prompts such as mathematical me let s do some math since we met last let s try it math talks manipulatives and models matter game time and more emphasizing an assets based approach to teaching math that recognizes the unique strengths and experiences of each student providing strategies for promoting growth mindset in math and equity and inclusion in math education focusing on both classroom level and building level improvement as well as offering support for teachers instructional coaches principals and district leaders power up your math community will inspire you to reimagine the way you teach math and empower you with the tools to make a lasting impact on your students mathematical understanding so get ready to power up your math community and watch as your students thrive in their mathematical journey

co written by a professor and 10 students this book explores their attempts to come to grips with fundamental issues related to writing narrative accounts purporting to represent aspects of people s lives the fundamental project around which their explorations in writing textual accounts turned derived from the editor s initial ethnographic question tell me about the previous class we did together this proved to be a particularly rich exercise bringing into the arena all of the problems related to choice of data analysis of data the structure of the account the stance of the author tense and case the adequacy of the account and more as participants shared versions of their accounts and struggled to analyze the wealth of data they had accumulated in the previous classes the products of in class practice of observation and interview they became aware of the ephemeral nature of narrative accounts reality as written in textual form cannot capture the immense depth breadth and complexity of an actual lived experience and can only be an incomplete representation that derives from the interpretive imagination of the author the final chapter results from a number of discussions during which each contributing author briefly revisited the text and through dialogue with others and or the editor identified the elements that would provide an overall framework that represents the big message of the book in this way the contributors attempted to provide a conceptual context that would indicate ways in which their private experiences could be seen to be relevant to the broader public arenas in which education and research is engaged in its entirety the book presents an interpretive study of teaching and learning it provides a multi voiced account that reveals how problematic turning point experiences in a university class are perceived organized constructed and given meaning by a group of interacting individuals

anti racist community engagement principles and practices centers anti racist community engaged traditions that bipoc academics and community members have created through more than a century of collaboration across university and community it demonstrates both the progress and the work that still needs to be done the book is organized around a set of anti racist community engagement principles developed by the editors as part of their shared work and dialogue with colleagues regionally and across the country the significant number of diverse voices that have informed the creation of the principles reveal the groundswell of work underway to center anti racist values and to pivot away from the traditional higher education centric and white savior ways of doing community engagement teaching research and

practice the chapters in this book are organized into four sections each focused on one of the four anti racist community engagement principles the first section explores the various ways in which reframing our institutional and pedagogical practices can help counteract the persistence and impact of racism on our campuses and in our community engagement work in the second section authors share practices that promote critical reflection on individual and systemic structural racism through examinations of positionality bias and historical roots of systemic racism the third section examines intentional learning and course design through anti racist learning goals course content policies and assessment finally the fourth section shows how authors have developed compassionate and reflective classrooms by creating a sense of belonging that acknowledges student cultural assets and contributions and meets students where they are to co create a supportive anti racist learning environment each chapter in the book introduces a specific example of anti racist community engagement with authors providing unique situated insights into the nature and complexity of the factors at play this is followed by a practice section where authors reflect on their engagement and the lessons learned through it thus leaving readers with detailed insights and roadmaps for adapting or replicating the work finally a connections section places the case and its practices into broader contexts of pedagogical curricular institutional and community change there is an open access digital companion to the volume where authors have shared materials that will help shed further light on their compelling practices including syllabi agendas handouts worksheets and additional resources

the book compares different approaches to urban development in singapore and seoul over the past decades by focusing on community participation in the transformation of neighbourhoods and its impact on the built environment and communal life singapore and seoul are known for their rapid economic growth and urbanisation under a strong control of developmental state in the past however these cities are at a critical crossroads of societal transformation where participatory and community based urban development is gaining importance this new approach can be seen as a result of a changing relationship between the state and civil society where an emerging partnership between both aims to overcome the limitations of earlier urban development the book draws attention to the possibilities and challenges that these cities face while moving towards a more inclusive and socially sustainable post developmental urbanisation by applying a comparative perspective to understand the evolving urban paradigms in singapore and seoul this unique and timely book offers insights for scholars professionals and students interested in contemporary asian urbanisation and its future trajectories
