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a groundbreaking examination of mel bochner s inventive drawing practice produced collaboratively with the artist encompassing both works on paper and oversized wall drawings made from the 1960s to the present this handsomely designed volume documents the first ever museum retrospective of drawings by mel bochner b 1940 drawing has long been critical to the work of this pioneering conceptual artist and essayists explore the theoretical framework and playful experimentation of his decades long practice the book conceived and designed in close collaboration with the artist features his own writings about his philosophy of wall drawings and reflections on significant exhibitions of his work bochner was a key figure of the minimalist and conceptual art movements whose first exhibition in 1966 is now recognized as seminal today the artist is known for works in a range of media that explore the conventions of language and visual art as well as the relationships between them his experimental works on paper canvas and wall all of which are celebrated here are a foundational

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arshile gorky c 1904 1948 was one of the central figures in american art s shift toward abstraction during the first half of the 20th century accompanying the first major retrospective of his work in almost thirty years this stunning book traces the evolution of gorky s arresting visual style nearly 200 paintings drawings sculptures and prints from all phases of his career a number of which are published here for the first time are beautifully reproduced including a large figurative painting from 1927 known previously only through its preparatory studies throughout the volume some of gorky s best known and most powerful works are paired with related pieces or with meticulous preliminary studies shedding new light on his artistic process illustrated essays incorporating recently discovered biographical information and photographs examine his experience of the armenian genocide during which he witnessed the death of his mother his collaboration with the works progress administration and his early explorations of abstraction and surrealism providing important reassessments of his life and career admired by many of his contemporaries and hugely influential on subsequent generations of artists gorky created a complex and deeply moving body of work that encompasses styles ranging from impressionism to cubism surrealism and the beginnings of abstract expressionism

published to coincide with the first major retrospective of david hockney s drawings in 15 years at the los angeles county museum of art this volume brings together for the first time an exciting selection of the works on paper and in sketchbooks of perhaps the world s most widely celebrated contemporary artist a chronology and select bibliography accompany the 145 color and 70 black and white illustrations

Edward Munch 1928 is widely considered to be one of the central figures in the rich and complex history of postwar west coast art like Richard Diebenkorn and Sam Francis his work has been greatly influenced by the brilliant light of southern California modernism and European and American abstract art are also echoed in Munch's work and the vitality of his diverse oeuvre radiates throughout this first major retrospective of his paintings and drawings although he attended art school Edward Munch is an autodidact who has labored to overcome his inability as he put it to draw three dimensionally and drawing has been central to his work the spine from which all of his art extends from his egg tempera paintings in the early 1950s to the horror shock paintings and drawings of the early 1990s he has found ways to investigate the relationship between spontaneity the legacy of abstract expressionism and control and balance inherited from Mondrian and the Russian Constructivists moving decisively from abstraction to figuration and from monochrome to tonality and color Munch like de Kooning and Pollock has consistently turned away from the predictable and has sought new ground in his bold exploration of forms and methods Edward Munch has avoided the label of a particular tradition and instead continues to reinvent himself with over seventy paintings and drawings that span his career this is the most comprehensive book on Edward Munch available today I felt as though these paintings were not something I created they were something I discovered Edward Munch

Kaleidoscopic intricately layered and colourful Tony Robbin's paintings have explored and experimented with the boundaries of mathematical space in art for more than forty years drawing on his extensive knowledge of physics and maths together with the advent of computer programming for geometry Robbin's paintings achieve a boundless effect the spatial fourth dimension is attained through his interplay of grids manipulation of structures and his use of colour and form across the canvas a founding member of the Pattern and Decoration movement in the 1970s Robbin has also always been fascinated with incorporating elements of pattern into his work having grown up in Japan and Iran his work often displays the elaborate decoration found in the art of these cultures Tony Robbin a retrospective chronicles the artist's remarkable forty year career from painting through relief sculpture to light art computer art architectural scale sculpture and finally back to painting Robbin's work has been shown in more than twenty six solo exhibitions since his debut at the Whitney Museum of American Art in 1974 and included in more than one hundred group exhibitions in twelve countries he holds the patent for the application of quasicrystal geometry to architecture and has implemented this geometry for large scale architectural sculptures based on quasicrystal patterns Robbin is also the author of several books published on the relationship between mathematics and art and he has lectured on the subject in Europe Japan and the United States a chronology and comprehensive bibliography complete the volume author this extensive presentation of work includes essays by art critic Carter Ratcliff mathematician George Francis and art historian Linda Dalrymple Henderson together with interviews with artists Robert Kushner and Joyce Kozloff and an insightful commentary by Tony

robbin selling points a definitive exploration into this brilliant and dynamic american artist s work features a commentary by fellow pattern and decoration movement artists joyce kozloff and robert kushner illustrations 49 colour 3 b w

keith vaughan 1912 77 was a major figure in post war british art who is known for his searching portraits of the male nude and his association with the neo romantic painters this book provides for the first time a definitive illustrated account of his life and work exploring his wide ranging achievement as a modern british artist

this book presents several original studies of artistically talented children and their less talented peers the focus is on the spontaneous drawings children produce and on the types of compositions children generate when given materials to compose milbrath s model of artistic talent attributes individual differences to the figurative abilities of talented children and her theory is richly supported by original examples of children s artwork

this collection looks back at the drawings and paintings done over a lifetime it began with a hunger to create by drawing when i was around twelve years old this book represents a chance to put them altogether into a whole that may make more sense from the start i have used drawing and painting as a way of calming down concentrating and focusing on settling things around me by calling them artwork i could make them look as i wanted them to remain i thought they should speak with my voice and say what i wanted to say it came natural to me because that was what i wanted it was just that simple i still see things that way there is the passing and there is the fixed it seems like there was a basic need to draw paint and express what was inside i could organize and put things together on paper or canvas that went together in no other way at no other time it was a way out of myself and i took it at times it was the best way to do things when was no other way i was first inspired by a glossy photo journal of the early sixties with photographs of caroline kennedy on top of a horse they went together and it all made sense her father was highly esteemed but was later shot while riding a convertible in dallas but caroline lives it makes for a sad story but that is the way that many stories go one lives and learns when i later tried to ride a horse in imitation it ran to the middle of an interstate expressway and stopped in its tracks i loved horses until i learned they were not all without fault i found they had a will of their own that was often greater than that of the rider regardless they were often better on paper than in real life i started drawing with a pencil and charcoal but later graduated to oils paints acrylics pastels and finally watercolours i saved the best for last
