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essays on a range of photographic topics by the recently appointed joel and anne ehrenkranz chief curator of photography at moma since 1839 offers a selection of essays by the renowned photography historian clément chéroux appointed joel and anne ehrenkranz chief curator of photography at the museum of modern art moma in new york in 2020 chéroux takes on a variety of topics from the history of vernacular photography to the influence of documentary photography on surrealism these texts newly translated into english and published together in one volume for the first time reflect the breadth of chéroux s thinking the rigor of his approach and his endless curiosity about photographs in this strikingly designed and generously illustrated volume chéroux presents unique case studies and untold stories he discusses ways of sharing images from the nineteenth century to the digital age considers the utopian ideals of early photography and analyzes the duality of amateur photography among other things he describes the appeal of photographs snapped from a speeding train and explains historical value of first generation prints of photographs through an analysis of key photographs taken on 9 11 chéroux shows that the same six images were seen again and again in the press widely ranging erudite and engaging these essays present chéroux s innovative investigations of the histories of photography

david levi strauss is a writer whose visual and intellectual sensibilities are both acute

and expansive his trenchant writings on photography and photographers have been collected for this volume from a broad range of magazines including aperture artforum and the nation in between the eyes essays on photography and politics strauss tackles subjects as diverse as photography and propaganda the imagery of dreams sebastiao salgado's epic social documents and the deeply personal photographic revelations of francesca woodman the timely issue of photographic legitimacy is addressed in the essay photography and belief and in the highest degree of illusion strauss discusses the media frenzy surrounding the events of september 11 as our world is shaped more and more by images and their slipperiness what he calls a media pandemonium in its root meaning of the place of all howling demons we need a mind and voice like levi strauss to bring clarity to our vision

examines photo essays from weimar germany's many social crises traces photography's emergence as a new language that german photographers used to intervene in modernity's key political and philosophical debates changing notions of nature and culture national and personal identity and the viability of parliamentary democracy

a provocative exploration of photography's relationship to capitalism from leading theorists of visual culture photography was invented between the publication of adam smith's the wealth of nations and karl marx and frederick engels's the communist manifesto taking the intertwined development of capitalism and the camera as their starting point the essays in capitalism and the camera investigate the relationship between capitalist accumulation and the photographic image and ask whether photography might allow us to refuse capitalism's violence and if so how drawn together in productive disagreement the essays in this collection explore the relationship of photography to resource extraction and capital accumulation from 1492 to the postcolonial the camera's potential to make visible critical understandings of capitalist production and society especially economies of class and desire and propose ways that the camera and the image can be used to build cultural and political counterpublics from which a democratic struggle against capitalism might emerge with essays by ariella aïsha azoulay siobhan angus kajri jain walter benn michael t j clark john paul ricco blake stimson chris stolarski tong lam and jacob emery

this anthology offers a fresh approach to the philosophical aspects of photography the essays written by contemporary philosophers in a thorough and engaging manner explore the far reaching ethical dimensions of photography as it is used today a first of its kind anthology exploring the link between the art of photography and the theoretical questions it raises written in a thorough and engaging manner essayists are all contemporary philosophers who bring with them an exceptional understanding of the broader metaphysical issues pertaining to photography takes a fresh look at some familiar issues photographic truth objectivity and realism introduces newer issues such as the ethical use of photography or the effect of digital imaging technology on how we appreciate images

from 1898 until shortly after world war i hartmann rampaged through the photographic world first as alfred stieglitz's iconoclastic hatchetman of the photo secession movement later as an unruly rebel sniping away at his mentor under the pseudonym of caliban one of the most prolific photographic critics of all time hartmann discovered many of our greatest photographers championed photography as an art form and sparked endless controversies about the medium page 2 of cover

these essays address us in the quiet voice of a working photographer an artist and craftsman who has thought long and seriously about his endeavor who has tested and questioned his own assumptions in the light of actual practice the result is a rare book of criticism one that is alive to the pleasure and mysteries of true exploration written over a ten year period and originally published in 1981 this timeless collection of writings now includes a new preface by the author

this critically acclaimed work brings us a new selection of poignant essays by master photographer robert adams in this volume adams evinces his firm belief in the importance of art photographers may or may not make a living by photography he writes but they are alive by it

containing 30 essays that embody the history of photography this collection includes contributions from niepce daguerre fox talbot poe emerson hine stieglitz and weston among others

photography both in the form of contemporary practice and that of historical material now occupies a significant place in the citadels of western art culture it has an institutional network of its own embedded within the broader art world with its own specialists including academics critics curators collectors dealers and conservators all of this cultural activity consolidates an artistic practice and critical discourse of photography that distinguishes what is increasingly termed art photography from its commercial scientific and amateur guises but this long awaited recognition of photography as high art brings new challenges how will photography's newly privileged place in the art world affect how the history of creative photography is written modernist claims for the medium as having an aesthetic often turned on precedents from painting postmodernism challenged a cultural hierarchy organized around painting nineteenth century photographs move between the symbolic spaces of the gallery wall and the archive de contextualised for art and re contextualised for history but what of the contemporary writings images and practices that negotiated an aesthetic status for the

photographic photography and the arts revisits practices both celebrated and elided by the modernist and postmodernist grand narratives of art and photographic history in order to open up new critical spaces written by leading scholars in the fields of photography art and literature the essays examine the metaphorical as well as the material exchanges between photography and the fine graphic reproductive and sculptural arts

collection of essays touching on the perils ideologically driven historianship the effect of computerization on photography art education the transformative impact of the lens on western culture the ethical issues raised by street photography
