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helps the user identify african american artists and locate published reproductions of their work ranging from the colonial period to the present

st james s unique biographical dictionary provides information concerning approximately 400 artists nearly 300 of whom were living at the time of publication although the focus is on fine artists sculptors painters and printmakers the index groups artists by medium listing photographers illustrators ceramists performance artists filmmakers quilt makers wood carvers and fiber artists an index of nationalities lists 26 groups from europe africa and the caribbean but us artists predominate approximately 300 nigerians and jamaicans are the second largest groups with 16 listings each the signed entries profile the artist and list the artist s exhibitions the institutions holding the artist s work and the artist s publications many entries provide photographs of the artists or examples of their work all illustrations are black and white reproductions and are indexed separately a four part subject bibliography covers general works and works on african african american and caribbean art profiles of some 80 advisers and contributors constitute the last section college and university libraries and large public libraries need this survey of black artists copyright 1999 american library association

from 1968 to 1972 st louis was home to the black artists group bag a seminal arts collective that nurtured african american experimentalists involved with theater visual arts

dance poetry and jazz inspired by the reinvigorated black cultural nationalism of the 1960s artistic collectives had sprung up around the country in a diffuse outgrowth known as the black arts movement these impulses resonated with bag's founders who sought to raise black consciousness and explore the far reaches of interdisciplinary performance all while struggling to carve out a place within the context of st louis history and culture a generation of innovative artists julius hemphill oliver lake and emilio cruz to name but a few created a moment of intense and vibrant cultural life in an abandoned industrial building on washington avenue surrounded by the evisceration that typified that decade's urban crisis the 1960s upsurge in political art blurred the lines between political involvement and artistic production and debates over civil rights black nationalism and the role of the arts in political and cultural struggles all found form in bag this book narrates the group's development against the backdrop of st louis spaces and institutions examines the work of its major artists and follows its musicians to paris and on to new york where they played a dominant role in lower manhattan's 1970s loft jazz scene by fusing social concern and artistic innovation the group significantly reshaped the st louis and by extension the american arts landscape

exploring the art and life of this important american artist whose work bridged the gaps between abstraction feminism and blackness howardena pindell reclaiming abstraction is a fascinating examination of the multifaceted career of artist activist curator and writer howardena pindell b 1943 it offers a fresh perspective on her abstract practice from the late 1960s through the early 1980s a period in which debates about black power feminism and modernist abstraction intersected in uniquely contentious yet generative ways sarah louise cowan not only asserts pindell's rightful place within the canon but also recenters dominant historical narratives to reveal the profound and overlooked roles that black women artists have played in shaping modernist abstraction pindell's career acts as a springboard for a broader study of how artists have responded during periods of heightened social activism and used abstraction to convey political urgency with works that drew on ghanaian textiles administrative labor cosmetics and postminimalism pindell deployed abstraction in deeply personal ways that resonated with collective african diasporic and women's practices in her groundbreaking analysis cowan argues that such work advanced black feminist modernisms diverse creative practices that unsettle racist and sexist logics

examines the lives and works of african american artists from the eighteenth century to the present with biographical and critical text and illustrated examples of their work

this groundbreaking study explores the visual representations of black culture across the globe throughout the twentieth century and into the twenty first the african diaspora a direct result of the transatlantic slave trade and western colonialism has generated a wide array of artistic achievements from blues and reggae to the paintings of the pioneering american artist henry ossawa tanner and the music videos of solange this study concentrates on how these works often created during times of major social upheaval and transformation use black culture both as a subject and as context from musings on the souls of black folk in late nineteenth century art to questions of racial and cultural identities in performance media and computer assisted arts in the twenty first century this book examines the philosophical and social forces that have shaped black presence in modern and contemporary visual culture renowned art historian richard j powell presents black art drawn from across the african diaspora with examples from the americas the caribbean and europe black art features artworks executed in a broad range of media including film photography performance art conceptual art advertising and sculpture now updated and expanded this new edition helps to better understand how the first two decades of the twenty first century have been a transformative moment in which previous assumptions about race and identity have been irrevocably altered with art providing a useful lens through which to think about these compelling issues

black artists have been making major contributions to the british art scene for decades since at least the middle of the twentieth century sometimes these artists with backgrounds in the countries of africa the caribbean and south asia were regarded and embraced as british practitioners of note and merit at other times particularly during the 1970s and 1980s they were not in response on occasion britain's black artists came together and made their own exhibitions or created their own gallery spaces in this book

eddie chambers tells the story of britain s black artists from the 1950s onwards including the contemporary art of steve mcqueen chris ofili and yinka shonibare publisher

a landmark work of art history lavishly illustrated and extraordinary for its thoroughness a history of african american artists conceived researched and written by the great american artist romare bearden with journalist harry henderson who completed the work after bearden s death in 1988 gives a conspectus of african american art from the late eighteenth century to the present it examines the lives and careers of more than fifty signal african american artists and the relation of their work to prevailing artistic social and political trends both in america and throughout the world beginning with a radical reevaluation of the enigma of joshua johnston a late eighteenth century portrait painter widely assumed by historians to be one of the earliest known african american artists bearden and henderson go on to examine the careers of robert s duncanson edward m bannister henry ossawa tanner aaron douglas edmonia lewis jacob lawrence hale a woodruff augusta savage charles h alston ellis wilson archibald j motley jr horace pippin alma w thomas and many others illustrated with more than 420 black and white illustrations and 61 color reproductions including rediscovered classics works no longer extant and art never before seen in this country a history of african american artists is a stunning achievement

humanities through the black experience is an invitation to enter into one of the most vital and richest cultural traditions in america from the introduction
